

Professor Christopher Atwood

Professor of Mongolian Studies at University of Pennsylvania

After getting A.B. from Harvard University (1986), where he was introduced to Mongolian and Chinese studies by Joseph Fletcher and Francis W. Cleaves, Christopher Atwood spent two years in Inner Mongolia, traveling and taking classes in the Mongolian language and literature department at Höhhot's Inner Mongolia Normal University. Prof. Atwood received his Ph.D. from Indiana University's Central Eurasian Studies Department, where he worked with György Kara, Lynn Struve, Elliot Sperling, and Jeff Wasserstrom.

Ambassador Slutz is the president of The Mongolia Society. She was a career member of the United States Foreign Service who served as U.S. Ambassador to Burundi from November 2009 until February 2012 and as U.S. Ambassador to Mongolia from September 2003 to September 2006. She was the recipient of two U.S. Department of State Superior Honor Awards and the Presidential Rank Award of Meritorious Executive. Ambassador Slutz retired on April 30, 2012, but continues to work part-time for the Office of the Inspector General, U.S. Department of State. She holds an MA in Asian Studies from the University of Hawaii.

22-23 juillet 2021: "« Along the River: Interactions between Human Societies and Valley Environments in the Convergence Zone of the Inner Asian Highlands »

The convergence zone of the Inner Asian Highlands lies at the intersection of the Himalayan, Mongolian, Loess and Yun-Gui plateaus, where the upper Yellow, Yangtze, Mekong and Salween rivers and their tributaries flow among towering mountains and segment the region into countless long valleys. Historically, these valleys sat on the overlapped margins of dominant centers of power. They have been the homelands of many remarkably distinct ethnic groups and also served as political, economic and cultural corridors between China proper and Inner Asia. The conference aims to explore how the riverine communities of different ethnic groups in these corridors have adapted to, negotiated with, transformed and interpreted their natural surroundings.

22 juillet 2021 : Paweł Szczap, « The Namescape of Ulaanbaatar »

ACMS Virtual Speaker Series

Date: July 22, 9am EDT | 1pm GMT | 9pm ULAT

Abstract:

Ulaanbaatar is Mongolia's biggest urban center. Here, traditional place naming and spatial orientation practices collide with contemporary top-down and bottom-up place naming processes. The talk will present an overview of Ulaanbaatar's multilayered toponymic landscape. Using examples from historical and contemporary maps, administrative documents, and photos, the presentation will introduce the main groups of Ulaanbaatar place names along with several phenomena regulating interactions between these groups and shaping the local urban namescape. Examples of unobvious etymologies will be explained. Differences between the downtown and fringe area (ger district) place names will be discussed alongside address policies and their impact on everyday life in the city.

About the presenter:

Szczap, Paweł, is a PhD candidate at the Faculty of Oriental Studies, University of Warsaw. He is currently preparing his dissertation in linguistics on place names in Ulaanbaatar. His research interests concentrate around the question of the urban in Mongolian culture and society and include the history and cartography of the Ulaanbaatar area, urban planning, address and administrative policies along with their impact on the urban population. He acts as an advisor to the Mongolian Visuals He is part of the European Hip-hop Studies Network and teaches a course on Mongolian hip-hop at the University of Warsaw. He frequently collaborates with the Ulaanbaatar City Museum and, while in Ulaanbaatar, regularly leads urban exploration walks around the city.

Publication : Tsyrempilov, *Under the Shadow of White Tara*

Tsyrempilov, Nikolay, *Under the Shadow of White Tara: Buriat Buddhists in Imperial Russia*, Ferdinand Schöningh, 2021.

The book systematically explores the history of the Buddhist community in the Russian Empire. It offers an advanced overview of the relations that existed between the Buriat Buddhists and the Russian imperial authorities.

Various institutions and actors represented Russian power: foreign and interior ministries, the Irkutsk general-governorship, the Orthodox Christian mission of East Siberia, local journalists and academic scholars. The book is focussing especially on the evolution of imperial legislation and specific administrative mechanisms aiming at the regulation of Buddhist affairs. The author demonstrates how these actors responded to conflicting situations and collisions of interests. Thus the history of relations between Russia and her Buddhist subjects is shown as a complex process with participation of a number of actors with their own interests and motivations.[Weniger](#)
