Vesna Wallace : "History of Kalachakra and Shambala in Mongolia"

Vesna A. Wallace is a senior Professor of Religious Studies at the University of California, Santa Barbara. Her fields of specialization are Indian Mahāyāna and Vajrayāna Buddhist traditions and Mongolian Buddhism. She has authored and translated four books related to Indian Buddhism, three of which pertain to the Kālacakra tantric tradition in India, published an edited on Mongolian Buddhism titled Buddhism in Mongolian History, Culture, and Society and more than seventy articles on Indian and Mongolian forms of Buddhism. Her most recent book, which is currently in the press by Oxford University Press, is an edited volume titled Sources of Mongolian Buddhism, and her forthcoming, co-authored book is The Text, Image, and Imagination in Mongolian Buddhist Rituals, which will be published by Columbia University Press.

Bourses de l'UNESCO

Ouverture par l'UNESCO d'un appel à candidature pour 12 bourses d'un montant de 10000 USD sur les problématiques des Routes de la Soie destinée aux jeunes chercheurs (jusqu'à 35 ans) :

UNESCO calls on young women and men under the age of 35 to apply for the 2022 Silk Roads Youth Research Grant. The grant aims to mobilize young researchers for further study of the Silk Roads shared heritage. Twelve grants of USD10,000 will be awarded per research project.

Deadline for submitting proposals is 31 May 2022.

The research needs to address specific issues relating to:

- the shared heritage and plural identities developed along the Silk Roads,
- its internal diversity,
- its potential in contemporary societies for creativity, intercultural dialogue, social cohesion, regional and international cooperation, and ultimately sustainable peace and development.

The UNESCO Silk Roads Youth Research Grant was first launched in 2021 and is organized within the UNESCO Silk Roads Programme with the support of the National Commission of the People's Republic of China for UNESCO, in the context of UNESCO Social and Human Sciences Programme.

ANNOUNCEMENT OF 2022-2023 SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAMME THE INSTITUTE FOR MONGOL STUDIES THE NATIONAL UNIVERSITY OF MONGOLIA

The three Scholarship Programmes in the honour of Academician Ts.Damdinseren, Academician Sh.Luvsanvandan and Academician B.Rinchen is now opened for international doctoral and postdoctoral researchers.

The main objective of these scholarships is to support young international scholars who are specialising in the fields of Mongolian Studies for taking advanced training and conducting fieldwork in Mongolia.

Scholarship Programmes:

Academician Ts.Damdinseren Scholarship is granted to scholars whose research focuses on Mongolian literature and history.

Academician Sh.Luvsanvandan Scholarship is granted to scholars whose research focuses on the Mongolian language, Mongolian script and Altaic studies.

Academician B.Rinchen Scholarship is granted to scholars whose research focuses on Mongolian culture and tradition, anthropology and ethnology.

Application Requirements:

- Scholarship will be granted to three selected international researchers who are under the age of 40 and pursuing their doctoral and post-doctoral research which is related to Mongolian Studies.
- A scholarship recipient should be able to start their research for 2022-2023 academic year and conduct their research in Mongolia for the period of three months. A scholarship recipient can choose their research period in Mongolia.

Scholarship Selection Process:

- Send your completed application documents to infomonstudies@gmail.com by May 16, 2022.
- Selected scholarship recipient will be notified by May 27, 2022.

Application Documents:

- Curriculum Vitae.
- The list of publications including research projects undertaken.
- Letter of Intent should state objective and scope of your studies, the name and department of the supervisor at the National University of Mongolia and specify which scholarship an applicant is applying for.
- HIV test which is required for Mongolian visa (only scholarship recipient shall submit).
- Application fee 80.00 USD (only scholarship recipient shall pay).

Scholarship Terms and Conditions:

- A scholarship recipient shall work under supervision of a professor at the National University of Mongolia who is agreed to supervise the proposed research.
- A scholarship recipient shall be provided with an international student dormitory free of charge. If a scholarship recipient chooses not to live in the dormitory, researcher shall arrange their accommodation.
- The monthly scholarship will be 800,000 mnt.

Responsibilities of the Scholarship recipient:

- A scholarship recipient shall give lecture and/or seminar on their research area at the Institute for Mongolian Studies, National University of Mongolia or at the affiliated department.
- A scholarship recipient shall produce and publish a research paper in an academic journal of their choosing as an outcome of scholarship.
- A scholarship recipient shall submit a written report to the Institute for Mongolian Studies on accomplishment of their research works completed for the period of scholarship.
- The recipient shall abide by the rules and regulations of the National University of Mongolia during the scholarship period.

Institute of Chinggis Khaan Heritage and Culture
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In Memoriam György Kara (1935 – 2022)

György Kara, Professor Emeritus of Eötvös Loránd University, corresponding member of the Hungarian Academy of Sciences, professor at Indiana University, Bloomington (1935 – 2022)

A leading authority of Hungarian and international oriental research, especially of Inner Asian philology and Altaic studies, György Kara was one of the most knowledgeable students of Lajos Ligeti (1902–1987), founder of the Inner Asian Department, which he headed as Ligeti's successor. His broad knowledge and command of diverse languages (he knew a multitude of living and dead Inner Asian tongues at high level) deserved the acknowledgement and admiration of his colleagues and students. He taught and researched using the text philological method of Ligeti, placing great emphasis on data from the vernacular Mongolian too, which he had collected during his early field research (his first longer field trip in Mongolia took place in 1957 with Katalin Kőhalmi and András Róna Tas). He was first of all a Mongolist, but he also published important writings in research areas related to Tibetan studies, Old Uyghur linguistic research and Sinology.

After the completion of his studies at the Inner Asian Department in 1958, his career path ascended quickly: with his works much cited to this day he attained one scholarly degree after the other. His

candidate's dissertation became a basic work in Mongolian dialectal folklore: Chants d'un barde mongol (Bibliotheca Orientalis Hungarica XII. Budapest, Akadémiai Kiadó 1970). His doctoral dissertation is an exemplary work in methodology and contents even beyond international Mongolian studies in elaborating written sources and analysing them from diverse viewpoints. Also, a basic work of any field of Mongolian studies, originally it was written in Russian and published in 1972 (Книги монгольских кочевников), its English version appeared in 2005 (Books of the Mongolian Nomads. More than Eight Centuries of Writing Mongolian. Bloomington, Indiana University Bloomington, Research Institute for Inner Asian Studies 2005). The list of his publications can be seen in MTMT and in volumes of studies published in honour of him.

He taught a lot, designing courses on the most diverse themes, often adjusted to the interest of the students. He was appointed professor of ELTE university in 1978 and of Indiana University, Bloomington, in 1992. He had taught at the latter from the mid-eighties, living – as he said – a “nomad’s” double life. He led the Inner Asian Department for three decades, seeing multitudes of Hungarian and foreign students start and complete their studies. He was helpful to the utmost. Our joint work was not cut off by his taking up the professorship in Indiana University. As professor emeritus he continued to supervise dissertations, act as critic and advisor.

His achievements were acknowledged with several awards and decorations, including one of the highest Mongolian prizes, the Order of the Polar Star. Thanks to the German Alexander von Humboldt Forschungspreis he could spend several months in Berlin and study the Old Uyghur and Tibetan manuscripts of the Turfan-Sammlung.

His unique personality owed to his idiosyncratic style, wry humour, and sharp critical sense. As a former student of his, striking a more personal tone, I would like to recall a few things from the time spent with him. He was particularly fastidious about the purity of the Hungarian language; he almost always warned his conversing partner when some foreign word was used. He always picked his words very carefully and used allusions to understand which you often had to have broad knowledge.

Our currently ongoing joint work was the volume being prepared for the 120th anniversary of his master Lajos Ligeti's birth and the organization and preparation of the conferences planned for the autumn, to which he contributed valuable science and university historical data.
